GUIDE BOOKS: ROCK CLIMBING IN THE PEAK DISTRICT DERWENT GRITSTONE action to the

THE WASDALE-MEET JUNE 17-19

Wasdale Head, the Sithplace of British rock climbing, where in 1886 Walter Farry Haskett-Smith solved the Napes Needle (..."we classed ropes with spikes and ladders as a means by which Lad climbers could go where only the very best climbers ought to be") is to be the boation for our next outdoor meet.

The valley is traditionally the finest centre for rock climbing with grades of all difficulty on good rybolite rock. The routes are generally well protected and possible in wet weather. It should be noted that routes on Pikes Cray and on the S. West face of

Great Gade dry very quickly and face the afternoon sun.

Englands most rugged and precipitous mountains are clustered around the head of this dale which boasts Englands highest peak expect take and smallest church, providing many 3 star climbs, walks and scrambles. Some classic climbs worth mentioning are:

(note: these are all three star routes and are sust the tip of the iceburg! wasdale positively bristles with classic outings)

Central Buttress. 400'. HVS. * * Probably the greatest classic climb in the Lake District' (Originally described as 'probably the hardest route in Britain': British Mountain Climbs. 1937)

Moss Ghyll Grooves. 260. HS. *** 'of outstanding interest'.

Moss Ghyll. 400'. S. ** "A route for all seasons, which can be ascended in any conditions by many variations'

Botterill's Slab. 290'. VS.*** "a compelling line".

Woodheads Climb. 150'. MS. ** One of the Lest climbs in the area at it's grade'

Thompson's Route 150' VD ** " a route of exceptional impact!

moss Ledge Birect, Hereford's Slabs, Sovies arete from Hopkinson's Cairn and Jones arete Proper 310' MVS ***

One of the finest outlings of it's standard in the Lakes'

Tophet Wall. 265' S *** 'A superb climb'.

Rib and Slab Climb. 300'S ** Fine open climbing on clean rock enjoyable even in the wet.
One of the finest stab climbs in the Lakes'

North West Climb. 445' MVS *** 'A fine climb even in wet weather'
