

Review of meets since last newsletter

St David's, North Pembroke - October 1995

The journey was infected with road cones and loads lost by lorries. It ended at the Farmer's Arms with the barman resolutely refusing to remove the towels he'd draped over the pumps only nanoseconds before we arrived. What's more, there were only five Ceunant present to commiserate smugly with us.

But we found 27 assorted members, old, now prospective and canine encamped with varying degrees of success at the Glan Y More site. Some devious traversing added interesting twists to the intricate catscradle of ropes. The Yoyo Prize goes to Joe and Sutty for their frenzied blitz of the whole crag. Maggie's record as Member Least Likely to Notice the State of the Tide remans unbroken and everyone else stayed dry. The abseil rope kindly provided by Nick suffered from the continuous abuse but happily we had all given up before it did.

At bit later we assembled in mellow evening sunshine around the cross in the square in St Davids for ice cream and team photos. The legend goes that St David arrived here in the fourteenth Century and carved this cross from an enormous rock as a penance for cursing the bastard who put it in the bottom of his rucksack. No wonder the Ceunant has an affinity for the place.

Indoor ice - January

Six of us made it to the Rope Race in Stockport, in appropriately cold conditions. Paul was in his element as the reception on Jazz FM got better as we got nearer to Manchester. Cost was £10 per hour for a party of two so we got three hours which with rotation and climbing worked out just right. The polystyrene has been there nearly a year and was beginning to show signs of wear. First into the fray was Nick who suffered balling up due to a big lump stuck in the front points. Not something seen very often on the Ben. We finished our day on their rock routes. The consensus was that they were applying Peak District, ie. Sandbag, grades.

Tyn lon work force

Places to visit

Skyline area - the Roaches, Staffordshire

As the new season is fast approaching you might be looking for some routes to put on your tick list. As an alternative to the Welsh or sea cliff crags we suggest a trip to a "local" gritstone crag.

The Skyline area, next to the Roaches is a crag providing great opportunities and has a number of qualities. It avoids the noisy crowds and queue's on the Upper and Lower tiers. The routes on the Skyline are small, but they offer instead a wealth of variety with technical interest in all grades from Mod to E7. It's a good place for both beginners and experts. Those who wish to top rope routes of greater difficuty usually have no problem in arranging good anchor points. On the whole there is quite a high proportion of starred routes in the guidebook. In addition, being in the Peak District National Park and at the top of a hill, the scenery is superb. Most days there are panoramic views from which you can see (amongst other things) Jodrell Bank in the Cheshire Plain, and apparently on a particularly good day, you can see the mountains of North Wales! Consequently there are plenty of opportunities for the walking contingent in the club. There are of course the Wallabies - they do exist - however remember that they generally see you well before you see them, and they don't respond well to raised and nervous shouts of "take in"!

Facts:

Location: After leaving the A53 Northbound from Leek turn left into the village of Upper Hulme and on up to the Roaches - grid reference SK 007621 to 002633.

Parking: OK if you get there early - otherwise park'n'ride from Leek.

Pub: Excellent beer and food at "Ye Olde Rock Inn" in Upper Hulme.

Guidebook: Staffordshire Gritstone (BMC 1989)

Access: As Roaches - find your way to the top left hand point of the Upper Tier - look to your left and about 200 yards away you will see Condor Buttress, the first section of the Skyline.

Routes:

Jonny and Andrew Woodward referred to a number of routes at the Skyline as gritstone classics. There are some excellent routes to try of all different grades. Easier and difficult routes are often adjacent which allows a lead on one and perhaps a top rope on the other. Consequently there are usually routes to suit all individuals in one location. The crag is separated into a number of buttresses and with patience are easily located from the path spanning the top of the crag. During a good day's climbing it should be possible to climb at all the main areas.

Whilst there are many routes of each grade the following should be on any tick list:

Condor Slab	VS4b	2Stars	Classic and bold slab climbing with a high and airy (& hairy) crux
Cracked Arete	HVD	Star	A polished arete, and well protected slab and crack

Safety Net	E1 5b	3Stars	A steep undercut followed by a slabby arete and tricky finish on an overhanging crack - superb
Tower Buttress			
Thrug	VS4c	2Stars	Absolutely wild! Power up the overhanging and leaning crack - without swearing if you can!
Tower Chimney	D	Star	Good 55ft beginners route with solid gear placements
Cave Buttress			
Cave Crack	HVS5a	Star	A mini Sloth - bags of fun in a central roof crack
Skyline Butress			
Slab and Arete	S	3Stars	The definitive gritstone severe? A rising rightward traverse leads to an arete
Acid Drop	E4 5c	3Stars	Regarded as "magnificent" - climbs a large slab and improbable roof
